Spay and Neuter Solutions was founded as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization on July 1, 2003, to address the issue of unchecked reproduction among companion animals. Pet overpopulation is an issue of great concern to virtually every animal welfare organization, many of which are overwhelmed by the number of homeless or abused pets in our communities. The goal of Spay and Neuter Solutions is to help make Arizona a pioneer state that can soon claim "no more homeless animals." We work closely with other animal welfare organizations, each of which has its own mission and goals. The sole focus of Spay and Neuter Solutions is in its name: we concentrate all of our efforts on spay and neuter issues.

We PROVIDE FINANCIAL ASSIS-

TANCE to defray the cost of spaying and neutering for individuals in need, and we **EDUCATE** pet owners about the importance of these procedures in preventing the birth of unwanted animals and in improving the quality of life for their pets. SUCCESS STORIES

Meet Leila. This sweet and very photogenic kitten was living on the streets, homeless and without any veterinary care, destined for a life in which she would most likely have numerous litters of her own as she fought for survival as a stray.

But fate stepped in when a compassionate good samaritan brought her indoors and then called Spay and Neuter Solutions for advice and help in getting Leila the care she needed.

She was one of 13 stray kittens and cats who eventually were



humanely trapped in this area and then spayed or neutered.

Leila and four other kittens were tame enough to be adopted to loving families. The other eight feral cats were released back into their home territory to live out their lives, but without continuing the breeding cycle that was overpopulating this Tucson neighborhood with stray cats.

This success story would not have been possible without the generous financial contributions that donors have made to our assistance programs. In addition, these animals would not have been helped at all if that good samaritan had not stepped in and took responsibility to get involved in her neighborhood, instead of waiting for someone else to take care of the situation. Pet overpopluation is a community problem that needs all of us to be part of the solution.

Please have your companion animals spayed or neutered and encourage others to do the same!

OUR RECENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

With your help, we have spayed and neutered more than 750 dogs and cats in our community during the first half of 2006.

We celebrated Spay Day USA this year by altering 89 dogs and cats at three locations in Tucson -on Feb. 27 at both locations of Animal Birth Control of Tucson and on March 14 at the Eastside Spay and Neuter Pet Clinic. Dr. Maria Curtis at Eastside is our newest partner in spay/neuter assistance services.

Our next big spay/neuter event was The Spirit of Nike Days on May 21-22. In addition to ABC and Eastside, we worked with Miller Pet Hospital and Ajo Veterinarian Clinic to spay and neuter 95 animals.

One memorable story involved a family who brought in 11 cats, even though they had no transportation. We sincerely thank Sharon Chamberlain, who volunteered to pick the animals up and take them back home after surgery. She also sponsored the cost of antibiotics for the cats.



A dog named Beautiful was found on an Indian reservation -- shy, starving and nursing puppies. Thanks to The Spirit of Nike, her new family was able to afford the low-cost spay for her.

Our fundraising activities have kept our volunteers busy as well. During the holiday season last December, we sold animal-themed craft items at two church bazaars. In February, the Marana Pines Golf Course hosted a FUNdraiser for us. In March, we received \$1,500 from the Pet Idol contest. Also in March, volunteer Wanda Winningham and her friends hosted a yard sale and donated the proceeds to us -- a whopping \$1,000! In May, Cynthia Taylor and Katie Powers hosted a Friendly Feast vegetarian baking demonstration at the Sunflower community in Marana.

We also would like to thank volunteer Corey Ames for putting in so much time for the animals and to Mary Phalen for her dedication to the trap-neuter-return of feral cats.

Coming up, we are looking forward to the 2006 No More Homeless Animals Day in August. This will be our third year hosting this special event, which features a candlelight vigil and pet blessing at the Udall Park amphitheater. Top 3 Reasons to Spay and Neuter

1) Pet Overpopulation It helps to reduce companion animal overpopulation. Most countries have a surplus of companion animals and are forced to euthanize or disregard their great suffering. The surplus is in the millions in the United States. Cats are 45 times as prolific, and dogs 15 times as prolific, as

humans. They do not need our help to expand their numbers; they need our help to reduce their numbers until there are good homes for them all.

2) A Longer Life

Sterilization of your cat or dog will increase his/her chance of a longer and healthier life. Altering your canine friend will increase his life an average of 1 to 3 years, felines, 3 to 5 years.



Altered animals have a very low to no risk of mammary gland tumors/cancer, prostate cancer, perianal tumors, pyometria, and uterine, ovarian and testicular cancers.

3) Health & Safety Sterilizing your cat/dog makes him/her a better pet, reducing his/her urge

to roam and decreasing the risk of contracting diseases or getting hurt as they roam. Surveys indicate that as many as 85% of dogs hit by cars are unaltered. Intact male cats living outside have been shown to live on average less than two years. Feline Immunodeficiency Syndrome is spread by bites, and intact cats fight a great deal more than altered cats.

OUR INSPIRATION

arry Houdini lived up to his name. An indoor-only cat, he slipped out the back door. But then he became disoriented and could not find his way back home.

He had been living a very comfortable life at a loving home in a northwest Tucson neighborhood. Now he was faced with the dangers of the desert outdoors, an environment to which he was not accustomed.

Even though Harry was microchipped, no news came about his whereabouts. His human companion, Corey Ames, remembers: "As the weeks went by, I just gave up. There was just no way. I didn't think he could possibly survive coyotes, bobcats, hawks, rattlesnakes, no water, no food."

As heartbreaking as the situation was, she and her husband thought they had to face the fact that Harry was gone forever.

After Harry's disappearance, Corey continued her volunteer work for Spay and Neuter Solutions, devoting many hours a month to helping companion animals and the

people who love them. One day, a woman called the organization to ask for advice on finding a home for a half-grown kitten she found.

Although the organization does not provide adoption services, Katie and Corey wanted to do their best to find help for the caller and the cat. So they agreed to bring a cat carrier over to the woman's home and transport the cat to a shelter. But the cat in question was not a half-grown kitten as the caller had indicated, but 14-year-old Harry!

"I went to get the cat less than four blocks away, and as we walked up the driveway, I could see it was Harry," Corey remembers. He had been gone for three months, but he was found just four blocks away from home.

Harry enjoyed his 15 minutes of fame, as he and Corey were featured in an *Arizona Daily Star* article titled "Short journey is incredible," with writer Kimberly Matas telling their amazing story of being reunited.

While he was fortunate to be able to live out his golden years safely at home, Harry was an elderly cat and developed health problems due to old age. He recently passed away.

All of us at Spay and Neuter Solutions wish to express our sincerest condolences to Corey and her husband Houston for their loss. We remember Harry fondly, and he gives us inspiration to continue our work for all the cats and dogs in our community who need our help.
