For Those of You Who Don't Know Who We Are...

Spay and Neuter Solutions was founded as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization on July 1, 2003. Pet overpopulation is an issue of great concern to virtually every animal welfare organization, many of which are overwhelmed by the number of homeless or abused pets in our communities. The goal of Spay and Neuter Solutions is to help make Arizona a pioneer state that can soon claim "no more homeless animals." We work closely with other animal welfare organizations, each of which has its own mission and goals. The sole focus of Spay and Neuter Solutions is in its name: we concentrate all of our efforts on spay and neuter issues.

We are dedicated to **PREVENTION** and EDUCATION. We provide for free and low-cost spay/neuter surgeries for companion animals in our community. We have negotiated discounted rates with participating vet clinics, and we pay all or part of this cost, depending on the need of the client. We also educate pet owners about the importance of spay/neuter in preventing the birth of unwanted animals and in improving the quality of life for their pets. Looking Back at 2007

ur fourth fiscal year ended in June 2007. With your help, we were able to raise \$44,499 during the year. Thank you so much for your outstanding support! That amount allowed us to help 971 animals! Because these animals will not reproduce in the future, they won't add to the number of homeless animals in Tucson and they will be happier and healthier. They cannot write thank you notes, but we know that we couldn't have achieved those numbers without your generous support. So, thank you in the name of all the animals we helped with your generosity! We all wish you a happy, healthy and successful 2008!

July was a relatively quiet month. We spent time preparing for our fundraiser, The Pet Rock Festival in October.

August's main event is always the No More Homeless Animals Day, which we observed by organizing our ever-popular "Free Fix For Felix" event -- we provided spay/neuter for 55 male and 2 female cats.

In **September** and October we focused on feral cat colonies. In October, to celebrate the National Feral Cat Day, we financed surgeries for 23 male and 13 female feral cats. These cats were Trapped, spayed/Neutered and vaccinated and Released (TNR'ed) to their natural environment where caring people will continue to feed them and monitor their health.

October was the time for our first Pet Rock Festival. Great vegetarian food, a plethora of donated auction items and DJ Kidd Squidd spinning the oldies helped make the event a success. The benefit, held at the Historic Y on East University Boulevard, featured music from the 1950s, '60s and '70s, food and beverages from local restaurants, caterers, wineries and breweries, psychic readings by animal communicator Linda Johns, and dozens of

donations - including, clothing, accessories, artwork and gift certificates - for the silent auction. Funds raised will help us further reduce unwanted litters that contribute to the population of homeless animals living on the streets of Tucson.

November was a rewarding grant writing month. The popular and unique Arizona Animal License Plate generated more than a quarter of a

million dollars, and that amount was distributed among different animal welfare organizations in the state of Arizona. Our organization is the proud recipient of a \$10,000 grant from that source. In **December** we were again invited and happy to participate at the International Bazaar at St. Michael's Church, where local nonprofit organizations gather to provide unique craft and art items for Christmas shoppers. For the first time in Tucson's history, thanks to your overwhelming support and the generous grants we received, we will be able to provide regular low-cost/free spay/neuter at the Eastside Pet Clinic,7036 E. Broadway, Ste.100, phone: 520-731-1714.

On the second Tuesday of each month, we will finance the <u>"Free Fix</u> <u>For Felix"</u> event for tomcats, and the fourth Tuesday of each month, we will offer the <u>"Sexless in Tucson"</u> event for the pets of low-income families. Regardless of animals' weight, gender or age, cats will cost just \$10 and dogs will cost \$25 to spay or neuter. We would like to

As you may know, Mr. Winograd has been involved in successful companion animal program reforms in San Francisco, California, and Tompkins County, New York. He has recently published a book called "Redemption: The Myth of Pet Overpopulation and the No Kill Revolution in America." He is an attorney who is now the director of the national No Kill Advocacy Center, whose "No Kill Equation" outlines the steps necessary for building no kill communities.
