Dot Jones, Past President of The Hermitage No Kill Cat Shelter, has been an active animal welfare volunteer for the past 27 years. After many years of fundraising and <u>managing the</u> <u>care of over 500 felines</u> at The Hermitage, Dot decided to redirect her energies and talents toward addressing the root of the problem, "pet overpopulation".



Dot initiated and single-handedly operated SNIP (Spay Neuter Intervention Project) as a model community-based program, targeting low-income populations throughout Pima County. In two years, SNIP funded fixes for 2000 dogs and cats.

At home Dot is the guardian to an active crew of five cats: Oliver and Henry - orange tabbies; Sebastian - a Bombay; Pretty Boy - a handsome tuxedo; and Miss Marple - a muted tabby/tortie. All of her cats are rescues and most are the result of student throwaways. In her work life, Dot was a Special Education teacher and a consultant to non-profit organizations. She also developed and provided special programs for disabled teenagers and adults.
